Agenda Item 1

Pennines Township Area Forums Code of Conduct

Conduct at meetings

Members will at all times observe accepted practice while taking part in discussions to:

- Allow each other the opportunity to speak and comment.
- Attempt as far as possible to stick to the agenda and assist each other to reach effective conclusions.
- Operate within the agreed Terms of Reference.
- Aggression, violence, threats, harassment, intimidation and other disruptive behaviour in the forum will not be tolerated.
- The consumption of alcohol is not permitted during the meeting, and anyone who is disruptive and appears to be under the influence of alcohol may be asked to leave.
- The term 'members' applies to all those present at the meeting.

Confidentiality

- Members will refrain from mentioning specific individual cases which may cause embarrassment or identification of an individual.
- Any information or item shared that is of a confidential nature will not be disclosed to anyone else apart from members of the Forum in order to allow the business of the meeting to proceed.

Dignity at meetings

- All those who attend Forum meetings have the right to be treated with dignity and respect regardless of their race, colour, ethnic or national origin, nationality, gender, marital status, age, sexuality, religion or any other matter which causes people to be discriminated against.
- The meeting will do all that is in its power to oppose all forms of harassment and bullying.

Individual Members

- Should disclose any personal interest that they consider may affect or influence their approach to the matter being discussed.
- Must show respect in all their dealings by observing reasonable standards and courtesy, and by not seeking to take unfair advantage by virtue of their position.

Political Affiliation

- Even though individual members may be affiliated to/or be members of a political party, they may not represent a political party in their role as individual members of this Forum.

Breach of Code of Conduct

- If anyone attending the Forum meeting does not abide by the code of conduct, the Chair will have the discretion to decide on an appropriate course of action. The Chair may either issue a warning, ask the person to withdraw from a particular agenda item or exclude that person from the meeting.
- Where a person is asked to leave a meeting, the Chair will have the discretion to decide whether or not that person is welcome to attend future meetings.

1. INTRODUCTIONS, APOLOGIES AND CODE OF CONDUCT

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and introductions were made. Attendees were asked to abide by the code of conduct for the duration of the meeting.

2. PACT - GREATER MANCHESTER POLICE

PC Hutchinson introduced himself and explained that he is the new Neighbourhood Beat Officer for the local area. He is getting to know the area and he is hoping to increase foot patrols during his shifts.

Police updates

- PC Adams is now part of the Volume Crime Team which deals with a range of offences that are being committed by the same person/people.
- The 101 number is a national issue. Residents were encouraged to use the live chat facility from the GMP website. PC Hutchinson will feedback residents' 101 concerns to his supervisors.
- There are new Police Officers in post, therefore, numbers/resources have increased.
- Investigations are ongoing regarding young people being coerced into crime; some are local youths and some aren't.
- Councillor Blundell advised that he did write to Baroness Beverley Hughes, Greater Manchester's Deputy Mayor, and her response was that GMP are doing their best with the resources available.

Residents' questions and concerns

- A discussion took place regarding the GMP statistics. The reasons why violent and sexual crimes are not listed was explained.
- Residents agree that local police communications on social media have improved, and it would also be good to see communications regarding changes to the neighbourhood policing staff on social media.

3. MILNROW AND NEWHEY RESIDENT WATCH

David Kendall introduced himself and Gillian Lennon to the forum and he gave an update on the progress of their community group. GMP senior officers are supportive of the Street Watch project and GMP has agreed to fund the insurance for volunteers. A constitution is now in place and a dedicated bank account is in the process of being set up. Volunteers will be vetted and given guidance by GMP before taking part in the scheme.

Councillors asked if they could know more about the remit of the group; it was suggested that a discussion needs to take place for David and Gillian to update the Ward Councillors.

There was a discussion about the crimes posted on social media not correlating with the crime statistics reported by GMP. It was explained that there is some education needed concerning reporting of crime which will be addressed by the group.

Volunteers are needed and they will be recruited via application; anybody wishing to get involved can contact the group via their M&N Resident Watch Facebook page or email milnrow.newhey@gmail.com

The forum praised the work of the group in particular the progress and partnership made with GMP.

4. MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING AND MATTERS ARISING

The minutes of the last meeting were accepted as a true record.

Action updates

Request damaged bin replacement on Sycamore Avenue/Laburnum Way

The bin was replaced on 3 November 2018.

Seek Highways' advice regarding the installation of parking bays on Huddersfield Road

Highways have advised that when this scheme was suggested in 2013 the construction cost was approx. £25,000 and the diversion of utilities apparatus was £86,000 which is prohibitive and therefore not feasible.

Back field at Severn Drive

Response received from Rochdale Council's Drainage Officer

I went to look at the area to view the current situation. Land Drainage law relevant to this situation is summarised as follows: A person or organisation who owns adjacent land (usually lower lying

land) has to accept any natural land drainage water (spring water, ground water or rainwater surface water run-off) from adjacent land **unless** the owner of the adjacent land has carried out "improvements" such that the run-off from the land isn't "natural" - for example if the entire back garden or land has been paved over. The farmland behind no. 1 Derwent Avenue is simply a field and doesn't appear to have 'improved the land'. The resident of no.1 Derwent Avenue can only expect rainwater running off this land to be dealt with by the landowner if it was to become a housing development site. By reference to RBC's land allocations <http://rochdale.gov.uk/draftallocationsmaps#housing> this land does not seem to be scheduled for housing, but I cannot be sure as this is not my department.

Resurfacing Willows Lane

Highways has requested Balfour Beatty organise a further back sweep for the full length of Willows Lane and letter drop residents to avoid parked car issues.

Resurfacing Newfield View

The area has been inspected and meets the standards considering the surface had to be laid by hand.

Parking at Hollingworth Academy

Highways have advised they will arrange to have the lines in this location refreshed as part of the lines maintenance programme. It is likely that this will be undertaken closer to the summer months due to road marking being a weather dependent task which should be done during the warmer, drier months of the year.

Parking was discussed and residents are concerned about access for emergency vehicles and the dangers to all road users during peak times. The congested traffic prevents buses from being able to leave. The Chair will speak to the school regarding the bus issue to establish the complaints made, and any information will be passed to Highways.

Action 1: Establish the complaints made by the bus company to Hollingworth Academy (Steve Lowe)

5. OPEN FORUM

Community Speed Watch

The forum was advised that GMP are to provide dates when they are next available to assist with the campaign. A resident will be leading on this initiative during the pre-election period.

Coronation Lodge

The issue is still with the Council's Planning and Legal departments, and this situation may lead to prosecutions in the future depending on the outcome.

Milnrow and Newhey Masterplan

Priorities will need to be set for the villages. Transport for Greater Manchester has a budget available for new car parks; the issue is usually that they don't have land available.

Crossing patrols

Residents expressed their concern regarding the crossing patrol proposal and the safety impact. It was explained that the Council are not proposing they remove the crossing patrol, they are proposing they remove the budget and ask schools to pay for the service themselves.

Brook at Butterworth Hall

A resident expressed their concern and frustration that the work needed to clear debris from the brook has not yet been carried out. Councillor Davidson explained that the Environment Agency (EA) are responsible for the work and she is working with Council Officers to ensure that the EA fulfil their responsibilities and carry out the necessary work to ensure the water flows as it should which will help prevent the flooding of the residents' homes.

Action 2: Update residents with progress (Councillor Davidson)

Pedestrian Island top of Bentgate Street

Residents reported that the island was badly damaged in a road traffic accident in December last year and the repairs have still not been carried out. Debris from the crash hasn't been removed and residents are concerned for the safety of the school children and pedestrians who have to use the island in its current state.

Action 3: Liaise with Highways to request immediate action and update residents (Councillor Bamford)

Harbour Lane gully and footpath

A resident reported that the gully is higher than the footpath causing water to pool and as a result the surface of the footpath is breaking up causing an uneven surface which presents hazards for pedestrians.

Action 4: Request Highways inspection (Tracey Knight)

Rear of Rochdale Road, Firgrove

A resident raised a number of issues regarding the land at the rear of Rochdale Road. Some issues have been dealt with by Environmental Management.

Action 5: Request Clean and Green Team clean-up (Tracey Knight)

Pot holes

Pot holes were reported at the rear of Sandringham Drive and Fairway; Bentgate Street and bottom of Severn Drive (the cobbles are also loose at this location).

Action 6: Report to Highways and request inspection (Tracey Knight)

Balfour Beatty Contract

A discussion took place regarding the tender process for awarding the highways contract. Residents raised concerns about the standard of work from Balfour Beatty. Residents were advised that an Officer has now been employed to inspect the contractor's work.

Experimental Traffic Regulation Order on Ladyhouse Close

A resident spoke against the Order which prevents vehicular access onto Ladyhouse Close from Elizabethan Way. For residents in this area it means they are diverted through the already congested village to get to their homes. Alternative suggestions have been submitted to Highways but there has been no response. One suggestion was to install enforcement cameras; this option has been looked at previously but wasn't feasible due to the cost. It was also reported that vehicles have been seen driving on the wrong side of the road to enter Ladyhouse Lane. It was explained this experimental Order came about as a result of the number of complaints from road users who were held up by vehicles waiting to turn right into Ladyhouse Lane resulting in traffic being backed up at peak times. Whilst some residents are unhappy with the Order, it has also been supported by others.

Action 7: Pass this information to Highways and request that they include the residents' suggestions in their final report (Tracey Knight)

Strange noise in Derwent Avenue area

A resident of Derwent Avenue had reported that she can hear a strange noise at all times of the day which sounds like it could be a factory or chimney noise. She wanted to check if anybody else could hear the noise before she reported it. Many other nearby residents confirmed that they could hear a similar noise.

Questions raised in advance

Council Tax increase

Why have the Mayoral Police Precept and Mayoral General Precept both increased by 13.8% and 13.2% respectively? This is more than 5 times the rate of inflation, so is not acceptable.

The question has been raised with the combined authority, and they have responded by saying they

Off road bike

An off road biker is frequenting Smith Hill daily from 3pm. Residents reported that two bikes have been seized recently which should help to alleviate the issues.

Travis Street, Newhey

Dead end/No Through Road sign at the end of Travis Street, Newhey. Cars are speeding up trying to avoid traffic even though the street is a dead end.

Highways have confirmed they have requested a 'No Through Road' Sign to be installed.

Untaxed cars

Untaxed cars on road, who do we report to? Reported to DVLA a few times, but cars still on the road?

Highways have advised that the Council has no enforcement powers regarding untaxed vehicles. Residents are advised to continue reporting issues to DVLA and refer to their complaints procedure if they are unsatisfied with their lack of response.

Crime

United Utilities employee was assaulted in Milnrow last week and they had their van stolen and three cars from one household have been stolen over the weekend.

Action 8: Issue forwarded to GMP for response (PC Hutchinson)

PCSOs

A resident suggested it would improve trust and public relations if the PCSOs engaged with the local community by calling into shops and businesses as they patrolled, which doesn't appear to be happening.

Action 9: Issue forwarded to GMP for response (PC Hutchinson)

6. EXTERNAL FUNDING UPDATE

Ellenroad

Ellenroad was unsuccessful in their HLF £38,000 grant application; this was due to lack of funds available and they have been invited to apply again.

St James Church

St James Church have secured a £10,000 HLF grant which they are match funding themselves. Work will begin shortly to restore the memorial and improve the footpaths.

Milnrow Clock

The Council have a budget of £20,000 and £3,000-£4,000 has been spent on preliminary work. It is envisaged that the total cost of restoring the clock will be £50,000. The Township has been asked to submit a Heritage Lottery Fund grant application for the remaining funds needed.

7. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

The forum was reminded that future meetings would be paperless. Agenda papers will continue to be emailed to attendees but paper copies will not be provided to everybody on the night of the meeting. A resident suggested using QR codes for those with smart phones so that they can access the paperwork on their mobiles at the meetings.

Action 10: Establish if using QR codes is feasible (Tracey Knight)
